Letter: Greetings,

We, the residents of Alcova Heights and adjacent areas, respectfully request that a permanent, public, protected bike/ped path be constructed along the southern perimeter of NFATC site. This would require that the proposed NFATC expansion southward be halted or amended, that plans to eliminate the existing path between S. George Mason Drive and S. Oakland Street be cancelled, that a permanent easement be granted to the County for construction of a public bike/ped path around the entire southern fenceline (connecting S. George Mason Dr with the corner of S. Oakland St/S. 3rd St), and that the County finalize plans to construct an east-west connector around NAFTC as envisioned in the Transportation Master Plan.

As a federal employee and an Arlington resident, I encourage the GSA and the County to reconsider their proposed action, maintain pedestrian access to the existing path, and study the possibility of expanding the walkway further.
