ALCOVA HEIGHTS SEEKS NEW COMMUNITY PARTICIPANTS

Alcova Heights Citizens Association is one of the most successful associations in Arlington. The reason for this success is simple: it is the residents and their willingness to support their community. However, over the last few years, the number of residents active in the Association has dropped considerably - to the point that the viability of the Association is at risk.

Over the years, the Association has received close to \$1 million through its participation in the Neighborhood Conservation Program. Among the improvements have been a new playground, gazebos, and landscaping in Alcova Heights Park, new street lights, sidewalks and other significant community improvements

The quarterly pot lucks and meetings are some of the best attended association meetings in Arlington. The annual Halloween Parade and the National Night Out have been tremendous successes over the years. In fact for three years in a row, the Alcova Heights National Night Out, held the first week in August, had the largest participation of any in the county. In addition, the Association has appointed members to positions on a wide-ranging number of local groups, committees, and panels.

In July, Lander Allin, the vice-president of the association, held a meeting at his home to discuss what activities the Association should be involved in and to find ways to get more neighborhood residents involved in

these activities.

It was a very positive meeting with a lot of interest and excitement about the possibility of establishing a "Welcome Wagon" committee to welcome new residents, holding a neighborhood-wide block party, and reinvigorating some of our committees - conservation. traffic, neighborhood watch - so that we can continue our efforts to make Alcova Heights a better place to live. We also talked about ways of getting more people involved so that we can minimize the efforts and time that any one person must commit to.

However, the bottom line is we need you, residents who are willing to spend a few hours every so often, to help keep the Alcova Heights Citizens Association runnina.

ARLINGTON COUNTY SCHOOL BOUNDARIES UPDATE


Arlington County Public Schools has been working to relieve overcrowding at a number of the South Arlington elementary schools. A number of schools have recently been renovated and enlarged, and a new school has been built.

The good news is there is now plenty of space overall for the elementary students. The bad news is that some students will need to be moved from overcrowded schools, such as Barcroft, to those that are under capacity. Earlier in the year, the School Board created a committee (made up of representatives from each school) to help redraw the school boundaries.

We will be having meetings on this subject at Barcroft over the next few months to keep our families informed and to seek input that will be shared with the boundaries committee. The PTA will also be sending home frequent updates on the process. Packets containing more detailed information will be available in the school office. If you have any questions, please contact Mrs. Hughey-Guy, Sara Uzel or Denise Noland. The boundaries committee meetings are open to the public. The next meeting is at the Education Center next Wednesday, October 2nd, at 7:00 p.m.

THIRD DISTRICT POLICE REPORT

In both of the reported rape cases, the victim knew the assailant. Arrests have been made in two of the five robbery cases and there are no discernible patterns in the others. Arrests have also been made in several of the reported burglary cases, including a break-in at the Dollar Store located in the 4800 block of Columbia Pike. Four juveniles have been charged with a break-in/vandalism that occurred at Kenmore Middle School on August 9th. Three of the other burglaries were committed in the Nauck community in late August and early September and a local resident was arrested and charged in those cases.

Auto related crimes continue to be the most prevalent in the district with Honda Accords and Jeep Cherokees being The Police Department is the vehicles of choice. sponsoring a vehicle safety day on Saturday, October 12th at the Thomas Jefferson Middle School from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Theft prevention and child safety seat installation will be two of the main focuses at this event. Members of the Third District will also be participating at a community event being held at Fire Station #9 located on Walter Reed Drive on Saturday, October 5th. We are hoping to set up a bike rodeo for the children at that event, which is scheduled from 10:00 to 2:00 also. Also being held on the 5th is the Walking Town Meeting for the Columbia Heights West neighborhood. We will gather at Tyrol Hills Park on South 7th Road at 10:00 and tour the neighborhood, discussing issues and concerns with various County agencies represented. For the adults, there is an "Oktoberfest" scheduled on October 12th at the Villages of Shirlington on S. 28th Street.

The Barcroft Neighborhood is just a short distance away and two of their residents have organized a new art event — Light In October — to take place on Saturday, October 12, from 1 PM - 8 PM at the Barcroft Community House, 800 S. Buchanan Street, Arlington. (Corner of S. Buchanan and S. 8th Streets.)

During Light In October, eight local artists will come together to display and offer their fine art for sale. One of the artists and event organizers, Peter Wood, is a metal sculptor and a friend of mine. He is a longtime Arlington resident who lives in Barcroft. Light In October will feature sculpture, painting, pottery, jewelry and photography. The display space is equally interesting. UPDATE ON MODIFIED SCHOOL YEAR CALENDAR (MSYC)

The administration, faculty, and parents of Barcroft spent the last year considering a change to its school calendar. This change, if adopted, would likely affect the 2003-2004 school year. Instead of the traditional school calendar, (Sept.-June), the new calendar would shorten the summer weeks from 10 to 5 weeks, and begin around the first week of August. Then, throughout the school year, there would be three optional "intersessions" to provide a fun, hands-on, low-stress, schooling at the end of each 9-week grading period.

Many schools across the country have adopted the modified school calendar with great success. Time is the crucial issue for students, teachers and parents. This new calendar provides more consistent time in school throughout the year to keep from losing so much ground in the summer, as well as lessening "burn-out" for teachers and students.

The Arlington County School Board heard final statements on the MSYC at their 28 September meeting. The school board has scheduled the MSYC for an Action Item on 10 October.
